

Nash Parish Council

Nash Park, further unauthorised building activity. Action by AVDC is still awaited to bring the matter before the High Court in order to enforce the injunction affecting the site. The Parish Council have been told by AVDC that they hope to be able to provide an update by mid-January.

The rebuilding of Church Farm. The deadline for compliance with the enforcement notice was 7 December 2017. The Enforcement Officer at AVDC wrote to the Parish Council on 18 January and the full text of his email is set out below:

'I would apologise for the delay in responding which in part has occurred because I have been concentrating my attention on Nash Park. The listed building enforcement notice dated 3 May 2016 as you mention had a compliance date of 7 December 2017. The Council, however, has the power to extend the period for compliance in appropriate instances where it is satisfied from the reasons given for non compliance, that reasonable steps are being carried out to ensure compliance, and that they will be completed with an acceptable time frame. In this instance Mr Lascelles has kept me aware of progress to secure compliance since the issue of the notice, and from time to time he has sought my guidance and comment on the details of the scheme or its implementation. However, for various reasons there has been slippage of around 12 months of his initial anticipated date for the erection of the timber frame, and that a start date of May 2018 is now planned with no indication as of yet of a planned completion date. I recognise the concerns expressed by the Parish Council and others that to date work has not started in earnest on the works and that the compliance date set out in the notice will not be met and that queries have been raised as to what action we propose to take to secure compliance, which is understandable in the context of the lengthy time line of the matter. In instances where compliance is not achieved within the given timeframe we have three options, to give an extension of time, to prosecute for failing to comply with the notice, or finally to take direct action and carryout the works ourselves. As a way forward for addressing the matters raised above, I wrote to Mr Lascelles at the end of November suggesting that he wrote to the Council requesting an extension of time to comply with the notice, supported by a brief chronology of action to date, an explanation why compliance has not been achieved by the given date and setting out the anticipated/ programmed schedule for the works. This information would give us a basis for considering whether an extension should be granted and by how much, together with a degree of confidence that if an extension was granted the work would be carried out. In similar instances we have agreed a rolling timetable of targets for specific stages of the development to ensure this surety. I enclose a copy of Mr Lascelles's response for your information and I have since received a copy of correspondence from the oak framing company, that reassures me that they have been engaged and of their programme for the delivery of the timber frame. The objective for serving the notice in the first place was to secure the rebuilding of the structure. In this case the owner has consistently since the service of a notice indicated a willingness to comply and has been working towards compliance and has entered into commitments with providers/contractors to carryout the required works. Whilst, it is recognised that regrettably there has been considerable slippage. it nevertheless remains the case that the owner is committed to carrying out the required works and to fulfilling the objectives of serving the notice in the first place. In that context an extension of the time taken to comply with the notice is the most appropriate option and in consultation with colleagues I will be formulating a rolling programme of the key stages of the works and timescales so that we can closely monitor progress.'

The accompanying letter from the land owner states that if the new frame is constructed in June then he would hope to be living in the house by September 2018 albeit the building will not be completely finished.

As the above has only just been received the Parish Council has yet to reply to AVDC on the matter.

Planning application 17/04533/APP – 9 houses on land at Church Farm, 4 Stratford Rd. Residents may be aware that a new planning application has been submitted. It is very similar to the previous application which was refused by AVDC, other than some changes to layout and additional planning and drainage arguments. While the yellow planning notice on site states that comments should be made by 25 January the Parish Council understand that comments can still be made after this date up until the date of determination of the application. However, the sooner comments are made the more likely they going to be considered by the Planning Officer dealing with the application. If you have not yet commented you are therefore encouraged to do so.

2018/19 Nash PC precept. This will increase to £13,300 from £12,500, an increase of 6.4%. This is the first increase in the Parish Council precept for 4 years. Almost half of the increase is a result of the Parish Council deciding to support a Play Around the Parishes event in the recreation ground on the afternoon of Tuesday 14 August, cost £350. It should also be noted that the Parish Council has taken over responsibility for the cutting of the grass belong to Bucks County Council. This has meant the grass is cut regularly every 2 weeks in the season rather than irregularly as was the case with BCC. The cost of this is currently £4,000 but the grant from BCC for the work is only £1,522 and therefore the shortfall is made up by the Parish Council out of the precept. Full details as to how the budget has been calculated can be found on the PC website under Finance.

New website. The Parish Council now has a new website which can be found at the original address, nash-bucks-pc.gov.uk

The village website can now be found at, <u>www.nashvillage.org</u>. There is a link between the 2 websites.

As mentioned in the last newsletter the reason for the new Parish Council website is to improve transparency of information relating to the work of the Parish Council and it is hoped that the new website will help residents to find information more easily. The change comes about as a result of the Government's Transparency Code, and which applies to small Parish Council's such as Nash. This requires a large amount of information relating to Parish Councils to be assessable via websites. There is a Government fund to help with the cost of a new website and the Parish Council has obtained a grant from it which covers the full cost of the new website arrangements.

The village annual litter collection – can you help? This will take place on Saturday 3 March, meeting in the Village Hall car park at 10.00am. It will last for 1.5-2 hours. Residents are encouraged to take part as this event plays an important role in collecting litter deposited around the village. Indeed it may be the only time that this is collected each year. Please bring gloves and wear stout shoes. Rubbish bags and litter collection sticks will be provided. Please note that residents taking part are responsible for their own safety as well as that of any children accompanying them. Each resident taking part will be entitled to a free pint of beer or glass of wine or a soft drink at the Village Pump later in the evening.

Adam Collins voluntary work around the village. Over the last six months Adam has been doing various voluntary jobs around the village for the Parish Council and the Church as part of his Duke of Edinburgh Award. The Parish Council (and the Church) would like to thank Adam (and his parents, Rhys and Cath in support) for the useful work carried out.

Potholes. With the deterioration in the conditions of the roads potholes are an increasing problem. You can report potholes, as well as any other road issue, using the Report It forms on the county council website. In an emergency, for instance a severe road defect, a flooded road, or a tree in the road, you can always call Transport for Buckinghamshire on 01296 382416 or 486630 (out of hours). Triangle of land between Little Horwood and Winslow Roads. Residents may be aware of the poor condition of this piece of land on the edge of the village. Owing to motorists driving over the land it is now severely rutted and service ducts are exposed and at risk of damage. As a result BCC are proposing to repair the area and install curbing and posts to prevent this area being used by motorists. No date has yet been set for the works.

Meetings. The meetings of the Parish Council in 2018 will take place on 12 April, 17 May (Annual Parish meeting and Annual Parish Council meeting following thereafter), 19 July, 20 September and 15 November. Meetings start at 7.30pm (other than the APM which starts at 7pm) and all residents of Nash are welcome to attend and speak.

Nash NDP

The Committee were pleased to be able to present the latest draft of the Neighbourhood Development plan to the village, in the Village Hall, on the evening of 20th January 2018, Despite the weather turning from rain to snow and bitter cold as the day went on, over 30 people came along, listened to the presentation and gave comments and suggestions for improvements.

The meeting agreed with the decision to go for a "Criteria-based" NDP and supported, with some agreed suggestions, the view that the criteria specified should help maintain the character of Nash while allowing gradual development in the future.

Prior to the meeting, along with a leaflet drop to every house, public notices and "Nash Alerts", the Parish Council added the latest draft of the NDP to their website. It remains there for you to read and print off. When any future versions are created, including the one with the changes from the meeting, they will be posted there too.

The next stage is to pass the draft NDP to the consultants who will ensure it meets required standards and they will then submit it to the legally-required external consultation process. Assuming that goes according to plan the referendum will be held later in the year, by AVDC, so that the NDP is legally adopted to include our wishes for how Nash grows over the next 20-30 years.

Visits to Greatmoor Energy from Waste

Do you ever wonder what happens to the things you put in your waste bin? Your recycling is sorted and passed onto recycling companies, but what about your non-recyclable waste?

So far over 2500 visitors to Greatmoor Energy from Waste have found out.

All of the residual (non-recyclable) household waste generated in Buckinghamshire is now processed at the Greatmoor Energy from Waste facility, at Woodham, near Aylesbury. Greatmoor is operated by FCC Environment, in partnership with Buckinghamshire County Council.

Greatmoor has the capacity to treat up to 300,000 tonnes of waste a year (approximately 900 tonnes a day), waste which would otherwise have gone to landfill. As a result, it generates a minimum of 22 megawatts of electricity to the national grid – meeting the energy needs of around 36,000 homes.

This alternative treatment of waste will result in a saving to Buckinghamshire County Council of approximately £150 million over the 30 year life of the contract.

Guided tours of Greatmoor are available by prior agreement and at no charge. Visiting groups have included WIs, U3As, Rotary Clubs, Scouts, Cubs, Primary Schools, Colleges and lots of others.

A group visit to Greatmoor can be tailored to your requirements and will include a tour around the facility, which includes the control room (where you will be able to see the cranes loading the waste), a visit to the viewing hatch providing an exciting view into the heart of the fire, the turbine hall and the huge condenser fans, which is an experience not to be missed.

The maximum group size for a tour is 15. School visits are available for Key Stage 2 upwards.

Cllr Bill Chapple OBE, Buckinghamshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Planning & Environment, said: "Greatmoor is a great asset to Buckinghamshire, and I'd really recommend that people take this opportunity to see the plant in operation and find out how it helps us reduce the environmental impact of our waste while at the same time saving money."

Feedback from visitors includes "The tutor had a really good knowledge and explained it all well. The tour was such a good experience and really interesting. I think that all the general public should have an opportunity" and "Very informative but not too much sitting around so the children got bored or disruptive - they were kept engaged throughout"

If you aren't a member of a local group but would like a tour, why come to one of our open tour days?

Greatmoor is holding four public open tour days in 2018. These are on the following Saturdays - March 17th, June 30th, September 22nd and November

On each day there will be tours, at 10am, 12.30 and 3pm. Please note that places are available on a strictly booking in advance basis only. There is a minimum age limit of 12 on open tours.



So, if you are planning to thumb through your seed catalogue make sure you don't forget the proposed vegetable classes for this year's show:

- 1) 3 tomatoes of one variety, but any variety can be shown.
 - 2) 5 beans of one variety, but any variety of bean can be shown.
 - 3) 3 root vegetables of one variety, but any variety can be shown.
- 4) The pumpkin with the largest girth.

 (This class will be measured growing in your garden as we don't want to spoil your Halloween lantern!)
