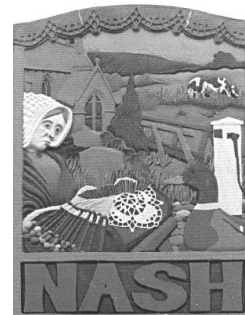

Fairtrade Fortnight : 24th February – 8th March.

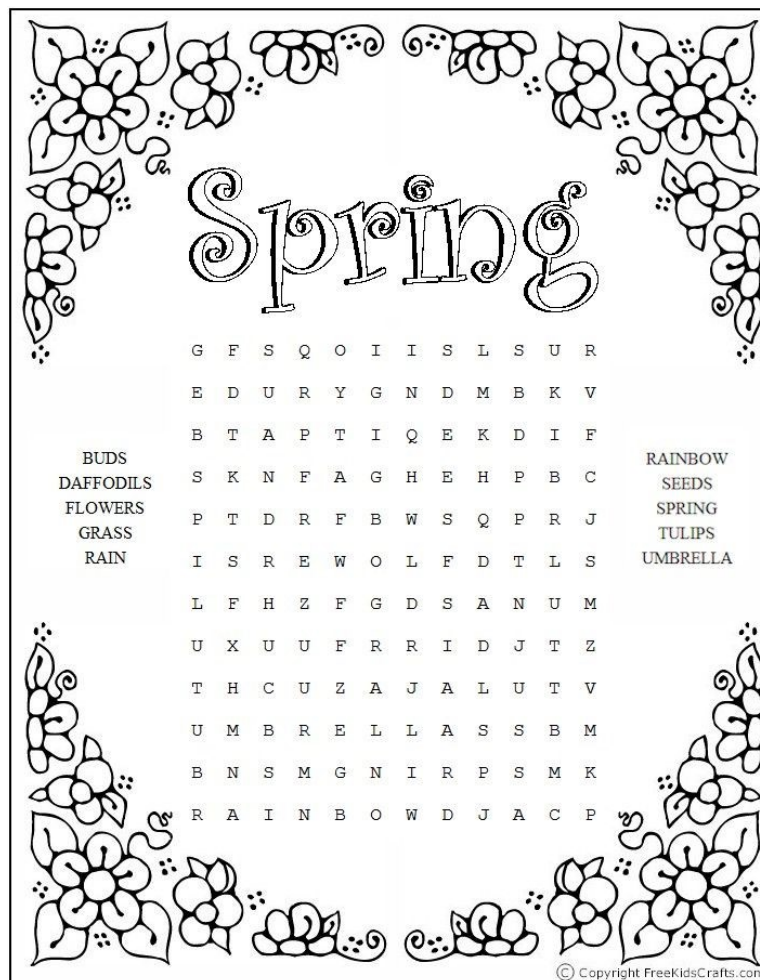
I will be holding another afternoon to raise funds and awareness for Fairtrade at Lomagundi, High Street on the 4th March from 2.30pm – 5pm.

Nash Neighbourhood Plan

The NP Committee were pleased to tell the Nash Parish Council, at its meeting on 9th January 2020, that AVDC planning officers had requested a face to face meeting to discuss our NP in detail, in early December, which two members of the NP Committee had attended.

The AVDC officers suggested changes to the boundaries on land adjacent to Wood End Lane and land adjacent to the Stratford Road. In their view, the needs of the village could be met without the inclusion of these areas. Their problem with these areas was that they had been explicitly excluded from future development and although Nash PC is free to include them if they want, AVDC would be unable to support the Nash NP if they were included. It was not something they had any choice over. It was clear that AVDC had spent some time going through our plan and the maps and documents provided and were otherwise happy with it. They were keen to stress both that they wanted to support us and if the plan is adopted they, AVDC, will very much see it as "their plan" too, with it being used to judge planning applications within the parish and seen as a core document for judging all planning applications.

Furthermore, Nash was also asked to cross reference the Nash Neighbourhood Plan with the newest version of the VALP (Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan) which was expected to be approved and in place before any Nash referendum. This would be very useful for Nash as AVDC's VALP is extremely comprehensive, has been externally reviewed, and has sections which define all of our requirements in far greater detail and in the unambiguous language of planning.

Finally they had some interesting suggestions on the benefits to Nash of defining "Green Spaces" within Nash, which we have taken back to the Nash PC . We are having follow on discussions with AVDC to see if doing so would add value to both Nash itself and the NP.

As we are all aware, AVDC is currently in the process of being superseded by the new unitary authority. This will not harm our NP but they have lost staff in planning, are finding it hard to hire new staff and are unexpectedly snowed under with work to complete the VALP. Consequently things are taking longer to turn around. But this is only adding a matter of days here and there and, once changes have been agreed between AVDC and the Nash Parish Council, all should proceed to the next stage, soon.

Nash Parish Council

The precept for the financial year 2020/21 was approved at the Nash Parish Council (NPC) meeting on 9 January 2020. The 2020/21 precept is £16,480, which is an increase of 19.9% on the precept for the current financial year. The increase reflects NPC's need to:

- (a) continue to meet its financial responsibilities in the context of rising costs
- (b) maintain healthy reserve(s) which requires recouping the money already spent and funding committed to opposing the Nash Park appeal.

NPC put in place an Ear Marked Reserve policy and appointed a finance sub-committee to take a more strategic approach to its assets; the level of maintenance required and where appropriate a replacement plan.

At its January meeting NPC also appointed a working group to make recommendations for village enhancements funded by S106 monies (new houses bonus). The provisional list includes: a major project to restore and overcome the village pond problems; purchasing outdoor adult gym equipment; erection of 'bandstand' type structure on the recreation ground; planting mature trees on the junction of the Little Horwood Road and Great Horwood Road. The possibility of a new piece of equipment for the playground and more rubber playground surface to replace the current woodchip has also been discussed informally.

Also worthy of note, is NPC's decision to respond to the consultation on Strengthening Police Powers to Tackle Unauthorised Encampments. The consultation is open to individuals – here is the link:

This is a historic year with the establishment on 1 April of the new unitary authority – Buckinghamshire Council. The new entity will replace the current County Council and four District Councils. It will be responsible for providing all major services across the County. The stated aims include reducing confusion for residents, removing duplication and bringing all local services together. During the ongoing planning phase, the importance of the local provision of information, advice and support for residents has been a prevailing theme. The introduction of 17 new 'Council Access Points' has recently been confirmed. The nearest of these for Nash will be in Buckingham and Winslow. Elections to Buckinghamshire Council, and the County's town and parish councils, are scheduled to take place on Thursday 7 May 2020. Hitler - Nash's part in his downfall

Later this spring many parts of the UK will be holding celebrations of the 75th anniversary of the end of the second world war in 1945. Nash has been more involved in this country's wars than we might imagine. Boudicca very likely marched by here, up the A5 on her way to meet her doom to Rome's legions, not far north. She was (un) lucky to get through the A5 before Milton Keynes Council managed to block some section of it off.

In the Civil War, Buckingham was a solid outpost of the King, protecting his headquarters in Oxford, whereas Newport Pagnell was a major base for Parliament, with Cromwell's own son based there. The area around Nash and Whaddon was described as "disputed territory" so we can only guess at what that implied for our now quiet streets, given the reputation of civil wars. Remember, there are still houses in the village which date from before the 1640s so our streets are a witness to nation-defining events.

The arrival of the 20th century was again to bring the impact of war to Nash. The importance of Bletchley is world renowned for its role in breaking enemy codes in the Second World War. It was chosen because it was half way between the universities and in easy reach of London. Less well known is the role that Nash and, especially, Whaddon, played in the same period, as Whaddon Hall served as headquarters of Section VIII (Communications) of MI6. The "Station X" wireless interception function was transferred here from Bletchley Park in February 1940. Whaddon and surrounding villages served in various super secret and vital roles, including the sending of ULTRA intelligence (material classified above Top Secret) from Bletchley Park to senior officers in the field be they in the desert, on warships at sea or the jungles of east Asia.

Whaddon Hall was responsible for the training of all Ultra radio operators working for UK forces everywhere in the world. All the equipment they used was built on site. Everything to do with secret communications during the war came from our small area of North Bucks with troops based in every village. Nash was no bystander in this. In the village are the remains of a radio mast which was manned 24 hours a day for the entire war to send and receive secret communications with Scandinavia, especially with agents and resistance forces in occupied Norway and Denmark, with some communications with France and as far as Yugoslavia. Nash was unusual in that its power was provided by batteries to ensure a smoother electricity supply, free of noise, so it could listen deeper into occupied territory. Though the radio listening station has gone, we believe that the battery building still exists. It is said that Nash and Whaddon are the last high ground until you reach Stockholm; an ideal site. We can be proud of the small but vital role Nash played in the fight for freedom during those dark years.

Many of the hilltops around here. from Calverton to Lenbrough's "Signal Hill" were festooned with aerials, some operational until quite recently. If you go to the back of the Church in Whaddon, looking towards Nash, you can clearly see the concrete foundations of its aerials and radio offices. Do any of you remember anything about their locations and operations, especially the one in Nash? This could be personal experience or shared reminiscences from previous residents. Please contact the editor as it would be great to gather this information, in such an important anniversary year, lest it be lost to future generations.

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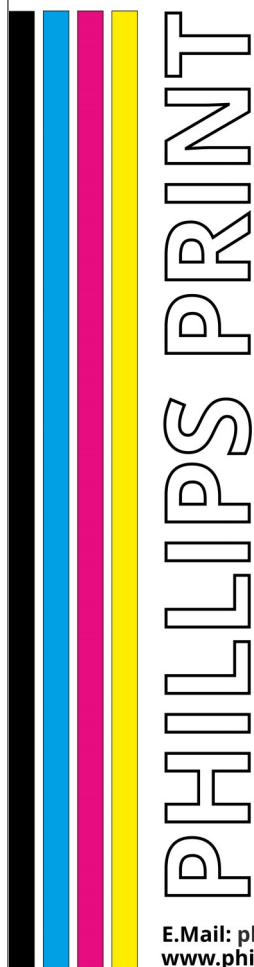
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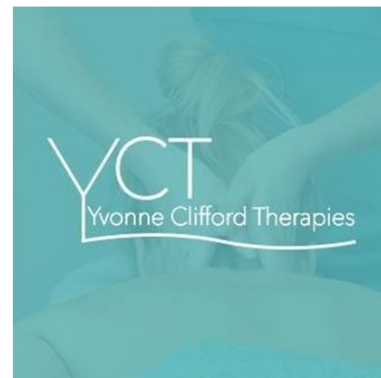

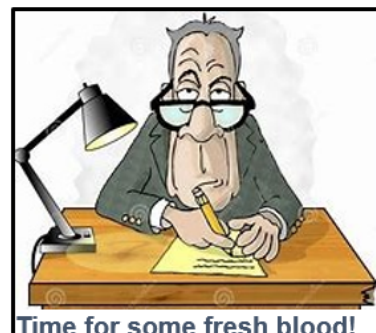
