Reflections from the Rectory by Rev'd Jacqueline Dove

Happy New Year!? I say this with defiant hope rather than any expectation that the new year is a happy one. So far it has been a very sad new year with the horrifying daily death toll from COVID and yet another lockdown disrupting our lives, and endangering the lives of those reaching breaking point. I don't think we even dare think about the state of the economy as a result of all this.

Of course, there have always been difficult times. Life is rife with tragedy. Lives turned upside down by a diagnosis, divorce, death of a loved one, debt, being made redundant, dormant dreams. However, there is something about the pervasive nature of this pandemic which is particularly depressing. I think this is why we feel like we are beginning to run on empty. I hold onto the hope that the suffering is not in vain as we re-evaluate what it is we truly value. That perhaps humanity might be wiser when we come out the other side of this.

What has the Church got to offer in these times? February sees the start of Lent and I'm wondering if Lent can help us through lockdown. I found it interesting to learn that fasting during Lent stems from a time when the winter food supplies were at their lowest. People fasted to make the food supply last longer. If everyone fasted together the community had a better chance of surviving.

So, in the past Lent gave spiritual significance to a time of physical hunger, and in doing so helped enable people to co-operate together for the common good. Though some people are facing hunger due to COVID, I think in Nash the key hunger is for connection. Perhaps this hunger for connection reveals a spiritual hunger for God, after all we are all made in the image of God.

I'm concerned that we are beginning to suffer from 'lockdown syndrome' rather like 'Stockholm syndrome'. The more we live cut off from each other the harder it is to reach out and connect. Especially as our energy levels are low. Maybe the discipline of keeping Lent provides an opportunity for us to connect with each other.

I'm still at the brainstorm stage regarding what shape this might take. I have a book: 'Candles in the Dark – Faith, hope and love in a time of pandemic' which is full of short reflections. This could form the basis of a book club where we meet once a week via ZOOM. I also have a book called: 'Wild Lent – discovering God through Creation'. The Oxford Diocese is providing a daily reflection through Lent which you can sign up for. They are also providing weekly visual and audio material looking at the fundamentals of the Christian Faith, this could form the basis for a weekly group (see *below*). Whatever form it takes there will be the opportunity to connect with God within us and between us and all around us as we look at lessons in Lent for surviving lockdown. *Rev'd Jacqueline Dove*

Nash Parish Council

Nash Parish Council (NPC) met remotely on 7 January 2021. The matters of particular interest to residents are covered below. The minutes provide the formal record of the business and are published on the NPC website <u>http://www.nash-bucks-pc.gov.uk/</u>. A copy of the minutes is also published on the NPC noticeboard at the Village Hall.

Planning and Planning Enforcement

There is increasing evidence that, despite the pandemic, the effectiveness of the Buckinghamshire Council Planning and Enforcement Teams has improved significantly under the unitary authority. The officers are working hard to achieve the objectives put in place to improve the service. The enforcement of the injunction and the restoration of the land to open countryside near Nash Park was a significant achievement. The Planning Enforcement Team has been congratulated and thanked on behalf of NPC.

Financial Year 2021/21 Budget and Precept Setting

The January meeting is held in the first week of the New Year to accommodate the annual precept setting deadline. The budget for 2021/22 has been set at £16,597 to cover NPC's known financial commitments. The Nash tax base for the next financial year is reduced because the number of people qualifying for council tax relief has increased. The pandemic means most local councils and principal authorities are facing reductions in their tax bases. To keep the precept at its 2020/21 level (£16,480) would have meant an increase of 2.95%. NPC approved the Finance Group recommendation for an increase of 5.01% to £16,810 for 2021/22. This represents a council tax increase of 2.374 (32 pence pcm) for a band D property. Any unspent funding will be transferred to the general reserve to help recoup the planning consultant costs incurred in the last 18 months and rebuild the reserve.

NPC is currently seeking to recruit a new internal auditor – please see the advert (on page 4 overleaf). And do get in touch if you may be interested and want to know more about this opportunity to contribute to your community by helping NPC.

Flooding

The flooding just before Christmas was compounded by the ineffectiveness of the culverts on the Winslow and Stratford Roads. The problem has been reported to Transport for Bucks. The ongoing problem of the drain on the Stratford Road bend has been reported again and Transport for Bucks has also been asked to clear the adjoining drain network. NPC is currently investigating possible flood prevention measures.

Nash Parish Council Next Meeting

The next meeting of NPC will take place on Thursday 15 March 2021 at 7.30 pm. At this point it seems safe to assume the meeting will again be held remotely. The agenda will again include the Zoom link to allow members of the public to attend.

Internal Auditor Vacancy

Nash Parish Council is recruiting a new internal auditor and has agreed the vacancy should be advertised in the village in the first instance. Although this is essentially an honorary position, a small fee can be paid - any expenses that are incurred will be covered.

The role requires experience in book-keeping and/or accounting and the person appointed must be independent.

Parish councils are required to undertake an internal audit to evaluate the effectiveness of their risk management, control, and governance processes. The Nash precept is currently £16,480 - the auditor process for small parishes is not onerous. The internal auditor completes a proforma for the internal assessor report which is then approved by the parish council for onward transmission to the external auditor. Prior to completing the relevant sections of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return, s/he is required to use the checklist to review the following systems and processes:

- 1. Book-keeping / cash book
- 2. Payment controls
- 3. Income controls
- 4. Payroll controls
- 5. Asset controls
- 6. Bank reconciliations
- 7. Year-end procedures; and
- 8. Exercise of public rights.

The deadline for applications is **Thursday 18 February 2021**. If you wish to assist your community by helping the Parish Council in this way and be considered for the vacancy, please send an email to the Clerk with your curriculum vitae or details of how your experience fulfils the requirements.

HOW TO ACCESS AND USE THE NASH VILLAGE DEFIBRILLATOR

WHAT IS A DEFIBRILLATOR OR AUTOMATIC EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR (AED)?

A defibrillator or AED is a portable defibrillator especially designed for people with little or no medical background. It is a computerised medical device that delivers an electrical current through the chest which aims to shock the heart back into a normal rhythm allowing it to pump again. Rapid response using automated technology can significantly improve the quality of life of a survivor. The longer the brain is starved of oxygen, the more damage can occur.

WHAT ARE THE PROCEDURES FOR ACCESSING THE DEFIBRILLATOR?

In an emergency you must **call 999** making sure that you give the address from which you are calling. If you use your mobile telephone, this will access any network it is able to link to, regardless of the carrier. Your mobile will transmit your GPS position.

The Nash village defibrillator is located on the wall to the right of the village hall main entrance.

HOW IS THE DEFIBRILLATOR ACTIVATED?

In all cases dial 999 first. It is really important to know that the professionals are on their way. The ambulance service will give you the access code to the defibrillator box. If you are willing, they will ask you to get this and commence the relevant actions. If you are on your own, ask friends or neighbours to collect the defibrillator from the village hall. When applied to the patient, voice commands, and screen messages will guide the user step-by-step through the process and its intelligent technology will only allow it to shock a 'shockable' heart rhythm.

DO I NEED INDEMNITY INSURANCE TO USE A DEFIBRILLATOR?

No. The patient is for all intents and purposes 'dead' when you arrive. Using cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) with a Community Public Access Defibrillator (CPAD) will hopefully bring them back to life. No one will complain about that! However, calling 999 and taking instructions from the ambulance service will automatically cover you anyway under their insurances. *Remember that you must call 999!*

DEFIBRILLATOR MAINTENANCE

The village defibrillator is checked every month by the Village Hall Maintenance Manager. The results of the checks are then recorded on the Community Heartbeat Trust website.

NOTE: These access instructions can be used anywhere. Calling 999 from your mobile will give your location. The local ambulance service will guide you to the nearest CPAD.

PLEASE KEEP THIS SHEET FOR FUTURE REFERENCE – Hopefully you will never need to use a CPAD.
