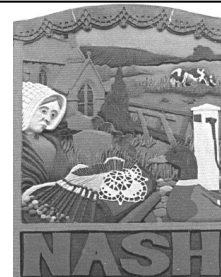

REFLECTION FROM THE RECTORY BY REVEREND JACQUELINE DOVE

I recently met with some Ukrainian refugees, while visiting the Church of Sweden with a group of clergy from the Oxford Diocese, and they mentioned their admiration and love for the Queen. As I write this the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations are looming fast

The word 'jubilee' has come to be associated with the ceremony and spectacle used to celebrate significant periods in a monarchs' reign and in the national life of the country. However, I found it interesting to read that the concept of a jubilee began in biblical times when God instructed Moses that every 50th year

was to be a time of celebration, rejoicing and rest – rest for the land and rest for the people. The word ‘jubilee’ literally means ‘ram’s horn’ in Hebrew, which was blown on the tenth day of the seventh month to start a year dedicated to rest, to restoration of property and to freeing people from slavery and debts.

We could certainly do with a period of celebration, rest and rejoicing after the past two years. Sadly, we still contend with heart breaking news. Life is always a mixture of joy and sorrow. In my last reflection, written during Lent, I mentioned our need as humans to change the orientation of our hearts from the pursuit of power, wealth and personal status which gets us individually, communally, nationally and globally into such a mess. President Putin is a classic example of where this path leads to.

I write this during the last week of the season of Easter season which lasts seven weeks in the Church calendar. Easter is when we get to practise the discipline of joy. Easier said than done in these troublesome times. My inner Eeyore has plenty to dwell on at the moment.

I came across the idea of practising the discipline of joy recently and I think it is helpful because joy doesn’t come easy and needs to be cultivated. Scientists explain that our brains are wired for bad news because at some point in our evolution we needed to be afraid, very afraid. Fight or Flight were apparently our main options to survive. So bad news sticks like Velcro and the default mode for our neural pathways is negative thinking. As Mark Twain said, “‘I’ve had a lot of worries in my life, most of which never happened.”

Joy is not a result of positive- *thinking- on -steroids*, think Tigger on his own. Eeyore and Tigger live together. I find that sorrow and joy rub shoulders together on a daily basis. On any given day I have conversations with people living with great sorrow. A much longed for and much needed hip operations is cancelled at the last minute; someone who was thrilled to get a new job is getting bullied by their new manager, someone who thought they had beaten cancer finds it has returned with a vengeance; a wife, mother, sister, close friend, much loved pet dies. The world is rife with tragedy and I mourn with those who mourn. However, it is also full of so much beauty and goodness, and when we notice this and give thanks for it, therein lies deep joy.

No British monarch has ever achieved a reign of 70 years before, and therefore the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II will be celebrated all around the world. This is certainly something to celebrate. Enjoy!

The Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on the 26th May 2022 at 7.00 p.m. in the Village Hall.

The meeting was chaired by the Mike Williams the Parish Council Chair and the following subjects were on the agenda.

The Parish Council report covered existing councillors who are David Carter, Rhys Collins, Kathy Hickey (vice chair), Mike Williams (chair), Barry Wyke, Len York and one vacancy (applications for the position are sought). The change of Parish Clerk as Alison Robinson is retiring and Debbie Evans takes over on 1st July 2022, was announced.

19 planning applications and two appeals were considered by your Parish Council last year. The neighbourhood plan has reached the inspection stage and the inspector (Andrew Ashcroft) has been appointed.

The precept has been raised for this financial year to £18,500. Nearly £40,000 has been spent on the children's playground and other projects included the Nash Exchange, Bat & Bee boxes, annual litter pick, village pond reed clearance, renovation of the pond bridge and knee rails and also both village pumps, a new flagpole by the Cross and new football nets donated by councillor York and a replacement bench on the recreation ground due to vandal damage to the previous bench.

Councillor Shekar who started the Nash in Bloom project has resigned from the council and we wish him well. This means that the Nash in Boom project needs new leadership and it would be good if that leadership could be found immediately.

There is still no neighbourhood watch coordinator, and there were no reports from the allotment committee, the Village Newsletter or the Church. Luis Ponte advised the chair that Openreach had stated that their objective is to have finished the Fibre to the Property project by October.

Mick Hedges submitted a brief report about the work of Elmer's charity and a village hall report was made by Phil Doran , village hall chair as follows:

Chairman's New Year appeal for funds from Village raised over £1500
Cakeaways and Cafes YTD have raised in excess of £1500– with a village contribution in excess of £1000 going to Ukraine Appeal

Buildings and Maintenance

Adrian Rawlings and Robert Meardon have built a comprehensive report relating to the long-term and short-term requirements of the Village Hall.

Main status from April Report:

Ongoing review and repairs of roof – including replacement of missing and cracked tiles as well as repair work to damp in kitchen ceiling

Ongoing review of damp patches on walls and further investigation work

New cooker (£300) and new Urn (£80) purchased.

New 'drawer's installed where low level cupboards were in island in kitchen.

Making it easier access for older residents/users (thank you to Richard Evans)

New storage facility to be purchased for carpark (approx. £600) and new safety ladders for ceiling work (£100)

Outdoor plug/electricity point to be installed on outside of annex

Review of flooring to be completed – does it need treating?

General maintenance OK – rear windows to be re-painted

Social Activities

Mary Vinakoti to stand down from Social Chair position. Position being advertised.

Main highlights:

- Monthly Cake-aways. Hugely successful. Introduced a charity element. Amazing support from bakers – provide produce free of charge.
- PACE Event – walking event arranged by Keith Hofgartner (£120 raised)
- Village Clean UP (supporting NPC initiative).
- Jubilee Celebrations – managed by Jen Brown – in association with Whaddon. Three events – Whaddon BBQ, Party on the Rec, Street Party.
- Pumps: Continue to be hugely popular. Well organized and run by Gary White. Introducing themes – Nepalese, Braai, Fish & Chips, Pizza Night.
- Lights: Lights were lit on Church for most of April in support of Ukraine (Des Hickey – aka Des Lee Travis – on Three Counties Radio twice!!) Lights also lit for one night in support of NHS

- Quarterly reviews/meetings with Whaddon VHC – first in April
- Village Quiz and Safari Supper to return in June

There were no questions and the annual parish meeting ended at 7.35 p.m.

Nash Neighbourhood Plan

Things are moving forward with the Nash NP. It was transferred to Buckinghamshire Council at the end of February. They carried out the Final Consultation Phase, required before it is submitted to an Independent Examiner, from the 18th of March to the 7th of April 2022.

Buckinghamshire Council were then required to ask for three quotes from qualified examiners to formally examine the plan, which they did. They selected one of these and forwarded his details to the Nash Parish Council for their consideration and approval. The Nash PC approved of him and he was duly appointed in the final week of May 2022, starting his examination on May 27th 2022.

The examiner is very experienced, having previously examined over 220 NPs. We were interested to see that as part of the tendering process the potential examiners were given a copy of our NP. In his initial view of the plan, the examiner praised many aspects of the Nash NP, which was gratifying to see. If the examiner is happy with the plan and approves it, it will be returned to Buckinghamshire Council and their Electoral Team will consult the Nash PC on the best time to hold a local referendum on the plan. Voting on the plan, a simple Yes or No, will be open to anybody on the Nash Electoral Roll.

Nash Village Hall Social Events Update

April

- The April PUMP had Gurkha Street Food attend and raised £280.42 towards the upkeep of the village hall. The food was fabulous and Nash folk got the gas burner working so we could have our suppers!
- Our Easter Cafe was another Cakeaway with 50% of proceeds going to the Ukraine DEC appeal. A gloriously sunny day with the event raising £295.34 towards the upkeep of the village hall and £355.35 towards the Ukraine DEC Appeal. There was a further £215 in donations towards the Ukraine Appeal - wonderful giving from Nash and Nash friends to support people in need
- The Nash and Whaddon Little Big Walk ran on Saturday 23rd April with walkers from both villages traversing the coffin walk to enjoy cakes at each other's village halls. This event raised funds of £105.07 towards the PACE Charity from Nash and £15 towards the upkeep of the village hall. A cakeaway was also held which raised a further £43 towards to the upkeep of the Village Hall upkeep. Some healthy competition on the village halls cake front!
- Cakes left over from the Cakeaway (served in stamped Nash Community Cafe brown bags) were taken to a picnic in Buckingham the next day, which was held for Ukrainian guests and their supporters in Buckingham and were very much appreciated by our Ukrainian guests

May

- The May PUMP raised £348.11 towards the upkeep of the Village Hall. Farm Slice attended and served delicious pizzas.
- A 'Cafe in the Annex', a smaller more compact Cafe took place on 11th May and raised £69.26 towards the upkeep of the village hall. This has been in planning for many years and finally able to be delivered
- The May Cafe/Cakeaway ran on Friday 20th May and raised £262.62 (TBC)

June and July

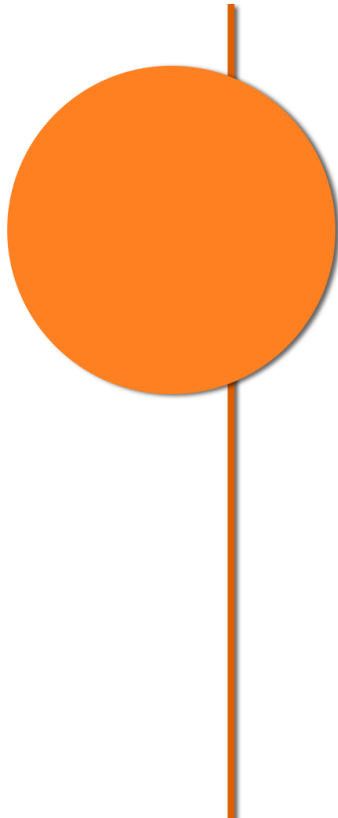

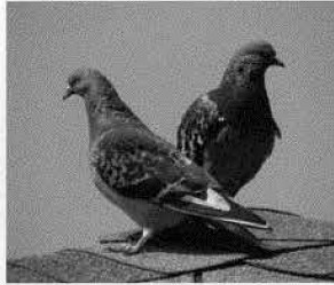
