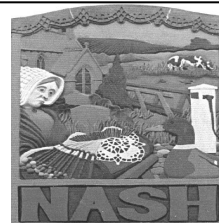

REFLECTION FROM THE RECTORY

The Reverend Malcomb Duncan writes daily night blessings (see Niteblessings on Facebook) and his blessing for the night we returned from South Africa, after my father's funeral was:

"Linger in Light. Let it warm your face, soothe your mind and lift your spirit. May God remind you that night passes but light is eternal. If you feel trapped in unending uncertainty and darkness, may God help you see that grace and love is unstoppable. Light wins."

This happened to be rather apt as I had had the opportunity to linger in light while flying above the clouds between Amsterdam and the UK on the last leg of our 24hour journey. I had a window seat and the sun shone on me. It struck me as I looked down at the impenetrable thick carpet of cottonwool clouds below, that only those above the clouds could see the bright blue sky, only those above could 'linger in light'. Sure, enough as the plane descended through the clouds as we came into land, the other side was very grey.

I'm aware there is a continuum of 'greyness' from being temporarily a-bit-down-in-the-dumps and extending all the way to feeling like you are totally 'done in' by your current circumstances. My time flying above the clouds reminded me that even when things seem and feel very grey, there is still blue sky above. Even when fear, despair and bitterness rule the roost – faith, hope and love still abound. When life feels grey, we hold onto hope knowing that the carpet of clouds blocking the sun is not permanent. This too shall pass is a good mantra for when everything seems grey, as we pray for the strength to keep on keeping on.

I also noticed as we approached the thick carpet of clouds that on close inspection there were occasional holes in the clouds, places where the sun could get through. I find the spiritual practice of being present to the presence of God/lingering in the light in the present moment can help me notice where the 'sun' is getting through. What has the potential to give me joy now, this very moment. It's often the very small things like spotting the Rectory Robin hopping about, pausing to truly savour a good cup of tea, being totally present to someone else. One of my favourite book titles is, Christ plays in ten thousand places by Eugene Peterson. When we linger in the light we notice Christ at play, in creation, in history and in community. Church Projects

We are delighted to tell you that after months/years of planning, we can now proceed with our projects to rewire the church, install new lighting and heating, renew the main path from the Stratford Road and replace and widen the path from the Village Hall carpark. This is only possible because of the reserves built up from past fetes, together with the generosity of Nash Village and All Saints' congregation and successful bids to three external grant awarding bodies. In particular, the most recent Gift Day raised

nearly £7,900 for which the church is deeply grateful.

The lighting and heating works are due to start in the church on 19 February and will take around 2 weeks to complete. This will involve the removal of the wall heaters and their replacement by heaters under the pews and choir stalls and the installation of 3 wall panel heaters. The lighting will be updated to provide movement generated lighting with different lighting options to suit the particular circumstances of use. One or two services due to take place in church during this period will take place in the Village Hall instead.

Work on the church paths has been put back until early March so that this does not take place at the same time as the electrical works in the church; the actual start date is dependent on the contractor's schedule and the weather.

Christmas

It was lovely that the church was full on Christmas Eve for the Carol Service. The collection from that service and the Christmas morning service was split between UNICEF and the Salvation Army. The congregations were very generous and each charity received £213.50.

Village Lunches

We are not putting any dates in the diary for the Village/Weekday lunches, until the work on the church and the paths has been completed.

Ash Wednesday

Following the Ash Wednesday Holy Communion service on 15 February, there will be a soup lunch in Nash Village Hall (at approximately 1.15pm). Donations in respect of the cost of the lunch (after expenses) will be given to Christian Aid.

Good Friday Children's Activity **Friday 29th March 10 – 11am**

Nash Parish Council (NPC)

The Parish Council meeting report

The parish council met on 25 th January at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

Parish finance was considered and the information in the finance reports was unanimously approved.

Matters around the village were discussed and the main highlights are:

Nash recreation ground and play area

Cllr Nicholson provided Cllrs with a document to update them on costs and a suggested timeline for completing the work. He has suggested delaying planting of the trees until November 2024 as the groundwork cannot take place until summer due to how wet the field is. Cllr Nicholson will request an extension to the grant provided by the Tree Council. At the next PC meeting in March, Cllr Nicholson will present all the quotes he will have received by then and seek approval to proceed.

Cllr Williams asked Cllr Stanier whether the PC can apply for extra funding for this project from the Community Board, seeing as the costs are likely to increase. Cllr Stanier believes anything is possible, but we would need to apply quickly due to the financial situation at Bucks Council. The next Community Board meeting takes place online on 7 th February, and the Community Board will require information from the PC by 29 th January for it to be included. Cllr Williams confirmed he will join the meeting.

Cllr Nicholson wanted to know what electrical cabling had been agreed to and how much power will be pulled from it. Cllr Williams confirmed 30amps and that this had been discussed with local electricians who were happy with the power load.

CCTV at the recreation ground

The Clerk has spoken to Akita, the supplier of the CCTV equipment and has updated costs. She has been quoted up to £500 for an onsite visit to quote for the installation of an electrical sub-meter.

Cllr Williams asked the Clerk to contact CSG UK for a quote for the CCTV equipment and installation.

Cllr Nicholson is going to speak to a local electrician and will pass their details onto the Clerk to obtain another quote for the sub-meter.

Street and road signs

The signs are still down or missing, but Cllr Nicholson confirmed that Matt Whincup from Bucks Council has ordered a new sign to be installed. This has been ongoing for quite some time and Cllr Stanier confirmed he will chase Matt about this again. Cllr Nicholson will also continue to pursue Matt to get the work completed.

Any Other Matters Around the Village

To receive an update on the village pump and to discuss the following points:

Does the PC want to repair the pump back to its working state or merely a decorative state?

Cllrs and residents would like to see the pump restored to full working condition.

Does the PC want to try and install a far more substantial crash barrier or railings around the pump – Cllr Nicholson suggested installing poles 3 ft into the ground surrounding the pump to protect the pump from accidents like this happening again. Cllrs agreed to delay making a decision on this until the pump has been repaired.

Does the PC want to contact the “Repair Shop” to see if they would be willing to sort the repair for us – Cllrs did not discuss this opportunity as they now have a supplier who can carry out the repairs.

Cllr Nicholson provided details on what had happened with the pump and where he was with the repair. A gentleman called Mr Goodger who works as a blacksmith believes he can repair the whole pump and he will supply the PC with a quote. Cllr Nicholson would prefer to give the whole job to one company, rather than to split the work amongst a number of suppliers. Mr Goodger has experience in working on pumps and his repair will allow the pump to be fully functional again.

To discuss the situation with grass cutting contracts

The Clerk was asked to speak to Ian Walker and ask him to provide a quote for the work currently covered by NJ Blackwell (two extra verges, recreation ground) and to also quote for the new Safesmart field and to cut around the planters. The PC need to look at the costs and decide whether to go back to Bucks Council Devolved Services to negotiate new prices.

The PC would like to say a big thank you to Anna White for repairing the flag in the village.

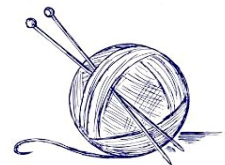

ORCHARD PROJECT ON LAND ADJACENT TO THE RECREATION GROUND

In 2023 the land adjacent to the recreation ground was purchased by Safesmart Ltd – A proportion of this land has now been acquired by a resident as a garden extension – leaving approximately 1 acre.

Safesmart Ltd has agreed with the Parish Council to lease the land to them for a nominal fee of £1 per annum for the next 100 years. This means the land can be put to good use for the benefit of the village community. The Parish Council and The Village Hall Committee have been consulted and the following project will commence in the early part of 2024

The project will consist of

- A community orchard of 120 trees - various fruits and variety's –The fruit produced will be for the benefit of all residents – The orchard will be boarded by wild flower planting - top & bottom
 - 15 x Apple
 - 15x Pear
 - 15x Plum
 - 15x Cherry
 - 15x Peach
 - 15x Nectarine
 - 15x Apricot
 - 15x Damson
- A storage container to house equipment used for the village fete and the festival
- A large Pétanque Court, next to the container, with the intention of running a Pétanque league for villagers
- Mains Water will be run down the edge of the recreation ground providing water to the Orchard and for any village events taking place in the recreation ground
- Mains Electricity will be run down to the container providing a much-needed resource at the bottom of the Recreation Ground

This is a large project to undertake and there has been a lot of work in the background to ensure that the cost to the village, of any project, is kept to a minimum and we are pleased to say that funding has been acquired from the following organisations: -

Tree Council

Winslow and Villages Community's Board

Parish Council

Village Hall Committee

Safesmart Ltd

Work will commence in the next few months for the Water – Electricity – Container and the Pétanque Court.

Sadly, due to the terrible weather we have had recently, the field is not in a fit state for clearing. When weather permits and the ground is in a less waterlogged state, the field will be cleared of scrub and grass seed will be sown. We will try to minimise all disruption during this time as most work will take place on or close to the new land.

With this in mind, the planting of the Orchard trees has now been put back until **November 2024** as they need to be planted whilst dormant - **This is when we will need your help** – The holes for the trees will be dug by digger but we need help planting 120 trees as soon as possible after delivery. We would love the whole community to come together on this weekend to plant some trees – All residents would be welcome especially family's. The children would learn how to plant a tree correctly and they can take pride in watching the trees they have planted grow and start producing fruit over the years. There will be Stakes – Ties – Guards & Mulch provided. I am sure we can do this in a weekend – If we have 40 volunteers then that would mean planting 3 trees each. If possible, Volunteers would need to bring a fork -a spade - a mallet and a watering can. If you don't have any of these please come anyway and some tools can be provided. The trees will be approximately 5 to 6 feet tall and with bare roots. Full planting instructions will be given on the day. More communication on this subject will be forthcoming closer to the planting date.

- Working to identify issues which are important to the lives of the residents of the Parish.
- Working to bring about improvements through:
 - local projects, lobbying other service providers and working in partnership with other parishes and agencies.

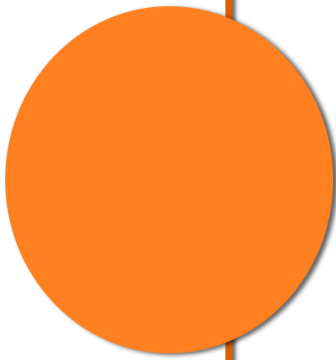

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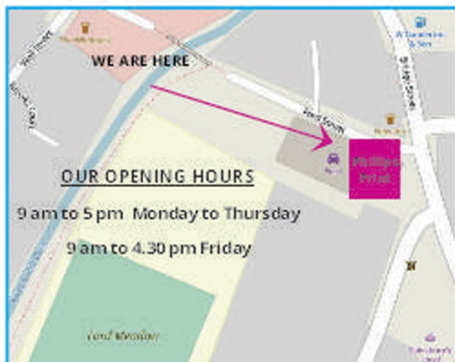
